## 38 Year Mystery Identity of the “Belle in the Well” Solved

IRONTON, Ohio – Lawrence County Coroner Ben Mack, MD hosted a press conference this morning to reveal the identity of the “Belle in the Well” as Louise Virginia (Peterson) Flesher.

The case commonly referred to as the “Belle in the Well” dates back to April 22, 1981, when two teenage girls discovered the decomposing remains of a female inside an abandoned cistern off McKinney Creek Road near the unincorporated village of Dobbston in Windsor Township of Lawrence County Ohio. The case was investigated extensively through the years; however an identification was not able to be made, and the case went cold.

The case was reopened in 2009 when forensic anthropologist Elizabeth Murray, PhD, Professor at Mount St. Joseph University and consultant for the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs) reached out to Lawrence County Coroner Investigator Bill Nenni about attempting additional methods toward identification. The body was exhumed in June of 2011 for examination by Dr. Murray and a bone sample was taken for DNA testing. Dental x-rays and charting were performed, and the first facial reconstruction completed. No match was made with any of the existing missing person profiles in the NamUs system. Nenni and Murray continued to investigate alternative methods to make an identification.

In February of 2017, Murray met Colleen Fitzpatrick, PhD, and soon learned of her newly forming DNA Doe Project's cutting-edge utilization of forensic genetic genealogy to make identifications. Murray and Nenni approached Dr. Fitzpatrick about using these methods in attempt to identify the “Belle” and other unidentified victims throughout Ohio.

In June 2017, the non-profit DNA Doe Project (DDP) agreed to collaborate with Murray and Nenni through the Lawrence County Coroner’s Office on the case. Using GEDmatch, a public genetic genealogy database, DDP discovered Belle’s family was likely from around Huntington, WV, but due to heavy intermarriage among families in that area, finding Belle’s immediate relatives proved challenging. **Continued on page 5**

The multi-faceted attempts to make identification continued in May of 2018 when Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation and Identification under Attorney General (now Governor) Mike DeWine released another facial reconstruction utilizing 3D printing replication of the skull by forensic sculptor Samantha Molnar.

On February 2, 2019 DDP was able to provide a tentative identification of Belle, along with names of family members who could be tested for verification. The 14-month effort consisted of 30+ volunteers, took thousands of hours, and necessitated review of over 40,000 individuals in family trees.

In March of 2019, a DNA sample was obtained from the youngest daughter of Louise Virginia (Peterson) Flesher and sent to the NamUs DNA testing center at the University of North Texas for comparison. On July 3, 2019 the UNT lab results were completed with a positive result identifying the "Belle in the Well" as Louise Virginia Flesher.

On July 29, 2019, a press conference revealing the identity of the "Belle in the Well" as Louise Virginia Flesher was held in Ironton. Coroner Ben Mack, MD, introduced case investigator Bill Nenni who had been the original investigator on the case and son of then Coroner Harry Nenni, MD. Forensic anthropologist Elizabeth Murray, PhD then presented specifics from the autopsy and the additional efforts that followed the exhumation. DDP Co-founders Colleen Fitzpatrick, PhD and Margaret Press, PhD along with their team leaders Anthony Lukas Redgrave and Lee Bingham Redgrave outlined the identification approach. Sheriff Jeff Lawless and Assistant Prosecutor David Marcum discussed the ongoing investigation efforts.

#### Background Information:

Lawrence County Ohio has a population of roughly 62,000 and is located along the southern border of Ohio along the Ohio River and adjoins both Boyd County, Kentucky and Cabell and Wayne Counties in West Virginia. The county seat is Ironton.

Ben Mack, MD FACEP has been with the Lawrence County Coroner's Office since 2016, and has served as Coroner since March of 2017. He also serves as medical director for Lawrence County EMS, Rome Volunteer Fire Department, and Collins Career Center paramedic program. He is board certified as an emergency physician and works in the emergency department at St. Mary's Medical Center in Huntington, WV. Dr. Mack has served on the Ohio State Coroner's Association Board of Directors since 2018.

Case Investigator Bill Nenni has been with the Lawrence County Coroner's Office since 1981. He originally served as an investigator and eventually chief investigator. He has since entered retirement and currently serves as an auxiliary investigator, with the "Belle in the Well" being his primary focus.

Thomas Andrew "Drew" Artis II is the current Chief Investigator for the Lawrence County Coroner's Office and is assisted by Michael Paul Bias.

Sheriff Jeff Lawless was elected to his position November 4, 2008 and has more than 25 years of law enforcement experience serving as Chief Deputy, Corrections Office, and Jail Administrator throughout his decorated career.

Elizabeth Murray, PhD D-ABFA is a Professor of Biology at Mount St. Joseph University in Cincinnati, OH and Forensic/Biological Anthropologist Consultant and NamUs Case Manager.

The DNA Doe Project, Inc. (DDP) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit humanitarian initiative to help identify Jane and John Does and return them to their families. The DDP is an all-volunteer organization of passionate, skilled, genetic genealogists. The DDP works with the best DNA labs in the world, applying advanced bioinformatics techniques to even the most challenging cases. The DNA Doe Project is proud to have accomplished many successful identifications that otherwise may have gone unsolved forever.

## When we have a coroner case and the victim is transgender, some biological identity issues may arise when completing the death certificate

**Q:** What box do we check for the gender question? What's on their birth certificate? What's on their driver's license? After some research, we discovered that one can get their driver's license changed (with a doctor's note). What the family wants? Other?



**A:** Ohio Department of Health—"It would be our opinion here, that the family (informant) answer that question for the decedent, since this information is part of the decedent's demographic information. Similar to many other questions on the certificate (NAME, MARITAL STATUS, ARMED FORCES, etc.), it is completely up to the informant to give the most correct and accurate information as possible, even if there are concerns that the information may not be valid. We will record whatever the informant provides without validating the information with other sources. If your question is more along the lines of a coroner completing the full certificate (demographics and cause of death) without family, he should complete the SEX question using their biological identity."

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## New Census Numbers in 2021

County compensation classes are based on the decennial census figures. The 2010 census numbers should be used until the 2020 decennial data is available.

Sometime in early 2021 (likely March), Ohio will receive the certified results of the 2020 decennial census. While the Ohio Revised Code does not explicitly provide an effective date for the federal census numbers relative to county elected officials' compensation, Ohio Attorney General Opinion 82-047 has addressed this issue. The Attorney General Opinion specifies the new population figures are effective on the date the Governor receives the data. From that date forward, the 2020 census numbers should be used to calculate county officials' salaries. If a county successfully challenges its population count under the U.S. Census Count Question Resolution Program, the revised Census population count issued by the Bureau in response thereto constitutes the county's population for the purposes of Chapter 325 (OAG 2003-014).

If the new population numbers result in an elected official being eligible for a salary in a "higher" pay class, such individual can move up and receive the higher salary in-term. However, the salary in the higher class will have to be prorated for the remainder of the 2021 calendar year. An official can only receive that portion of the calendar year salary prorated from the date the Governor receives the 2020 Census data for the remainder of the calendar year 2021.

If the new population numbers place an elected official in a lower pay class, such official is to remain in his/her current pay class for the remainder of his/her current term of office. Ohio revised Code Section 325.22 provides that an official's salary cannot be reduced during the remainder of his/her term of office on account of a decline in population of the county. However, upon commencement of a new term of office, such official would be paid at the lower salary to correspond with the 2020 census data.

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# 2019 Regional Overdose Death Investigation Training

We are very pleased to report the response and attendance for the 2019 Regional Overdose Death Investigation Training was fantastic. A total of 140 individuals participated. Sessions were held in Cleveland (Cuyahoga County Medical Examiner's Office), Bowling Green (BGSU/BCI), Columbus Ohio (Hilton at Easton ( Case Western Reserve University), Athens ( Ohio University Inn) and Dayton (Sinclair Community College).

Recently, the topic of organ, eye and tissue donation and the role of organ procurement organizations (OPOs) have become a conversation of interest. As Ohio's OPO collaborative, Donate Life Ohio, we want to extend ourselves to you as a resource for accurate information about the work being done to save and heal lives in our state through donation.

For more than 50 years, medical advancements in the area of organ, eye and tissue transplantation have emerged as the preferred - and often the only - treatment for many life-threatening conditions, and the need for donation continues to grow. Today there are more than 113,000 Americans on the organ transplant waiting list, and more than 3,000 of them are waiting in Ohio.

Ohio has four OPOs who work together to facilitate the recovery process, honor the decision of registered deceased donors, honor the decisions made by family members, transport lifesaving organs to transplant centers locally and across the country and recover life-enhancing tissue.

Since the inception of the Ohio Donor Registry in 2002, Ohio OPOs have worked to increase the number of organs, corneas and tissues donated and recovered to ultimately save and heal lives through transplantation. Last year alone, 431 organ donors in the Ohio donated more than 1,356 lifesaving organs, and 2,375 Ohioans shared the give of healing through tissue and cornea donation.

Our work in Ohio reflects the national trend of the other 54 OPOs across the country, who are on track to realize a significant increase in deceased donation over 2018's record year. Projections reflect an additional 1,000 donors and 3,000 organs transplanted nationwide by the end of this year.

Donate Life Ohio collaborates with Ohio's 88 coroners and medical examiners across the state to accommodate the needs of case investigation and legal standards while maximizing the opportunity for donation. Our teams work together to navigate time restraints, provide expert pathology reports, take photographs and develop best practices to save lives by honoring the donation decisions of individuals and their families.

Donate Life Ohio has also cultivated an active presence at the Ohio Statehouse, pursuing legislation to support our mission. We created an income tax deduction of up to \$10,000 for expenses incurred by a taxpayer who makes a living organ donation. We passed legislation that would require donation education in high schools throughout Ohio. In collaboration with the Ohio Department of Public Safety and the Ohio Department of Health, we created an app that would allow Ohioans to register to become donors.

Currently, in the 133<sup>rd</sup> Ohio General Assembly, we are pursuing legislation (HB 125) that would increase the funding of the Second Chance Trust Fund by adding an opportunity for Ohioans to contribute a dollar when renewing their vehicle registration. The OPOs have also been active



supporters of House Bill 41, which would prohibit insurance companies from discriminating against Ohioans who have selflessly served as a living donor in order to save someone else's life.

Working with the Ohio Department of Public Safety, Ohio Department of Health, and other key stakeholders, we have remained an active collaborator when it comes to crafting policies that increase the number of registered donors, enhance education efforts surrounding donation, and ensure best practices for donation so that Ohio's OPOs remain a standard-bearer for donation in the nation.

As a state collaborative, Donate Life Ohio's collective mission to save and heal lives through organ, eye and tissue donation is fueled by the impact donation has on our donor families, neighbors, communities and fellow Ohioans. While our progress is encouraging, 148 people in Ohio still died in 2018 waiting for an organ transplant— nearly one person every other day. Our work is far from done.

As you encounter conversations about this topic, please consider us a resource for your questions about organ, eye and tissue donation. And join us as we work to empower our state to save and heal lives through the generous act of donation.
